Popular walk to Rubicon Dam

Last Saturday, over 50 people of all ages enjoyed a 10km return walk to Rubicon Dam in the Rubicon Valley Historic Area organised by the Rubicon Forest Protection Group Inc..

Passing through magnificent tall alpine ash and shining gum forest with its dense understory of shrubs, the group listened to a poem by C J Dennis about working bullocks in the forests around Toolangi in the early days while a whip bird called in the background. Another highlight was the prolific flowering native flaxlily, Dianella tasmanica with its distinctive purple flower spikes and strappy leaves hanging over the aqueduct.

Ken Deacon and other walkers revealed snippets about the intriguing engineering feats

achieved in the construction of the Rubicon Valley hydro scheme, including the fast flowing aqueduct, trestle bridges and railway line. After a challenging. awkward squeeze to get onto the Rubicon Dam wall, the group returned energised by the refreshing forenvironment, est companfriends. ionship and new
